WHO EVALUATES MEANS OF EGRESS?

SUMMARY

There are many roles and responsibilities for a project with respect of Means of Egress. Specific project circumstances, jurisdictional requirements and other factors can influence *who* provides and is responsible for the design and implementation of Egress requirements. In general, during design:

- The **Architect** is *usually* the captain for the design of a project. They often are the point person and responsible party for sizing, locating, and making sure that egress components meet the requirements of the building code.
- A **Consultant** can, and often does, help with egress. This is especially true for novel, complex, or unique situations. A consultant may suggest solutions for code compliance, may review plans and provide recommendations to comply with code, may answer questions, may submit code modification requests, and/or may speak directly with the jurisdictions to develop code-compliant solutions.
- An Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) acts as a third-party check. They are not professionally responsible or liable for ensuring that a building
 meets code. It is the responsible design professional's duty and liability for situations where the building does not meet code. This role usually
 takes the form of plan review and inspections as a check to ensure the building is safe to construct, occupy, and has features for the fire
 department to effectively fight a fire.

During the lifetime of the building:

- A **building owner** is responsible, by code, to maintain the building in a safe manner. This includes ensuring that the means of egress remains reliable (cannot be locked, blocked, or otherwise rendered unusable).
- An **Inspector** will perform regular (usually annual, but can vary) inspections as a check to help maintain code compliance.



Architect
(Generally the "captain" and responsible design professional for means of egress decisions)



Consultant (Can help provide solutions and/or review work)



Authority Having Jurisdiction
(Includes plan review and inspections as a "check",
but not as the responsible design professional)



Building Owner (responsible for maintaining the building in a safe manner)



Inspector (Authority Having Jurisdiction)
(Regular inspections during lifetime of the building)

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
